What is Autism?

Autism, or autism spectrum disorder (ASD), refers to a broad range of conditions characterized by challenges with social skills, repetitive behaviors, speech and nonverbal communication. According to the Centers for Disease Control, autism affects an estimated 1 in 36 children in the United States today.

We know that there is not one autism but many subtypes, most influenced by a combination of genetic and environmental factors. Because autism is a spectrum disorder, each person with autism has a distinct set of strengths and challenges. The ways in which people with autism learn, think and problem-solve can range from highly skilled to severely challenged. Some people with ASD may require significant support in their daily lives, while others may need less support and, in some cases, live entirely independently.

Several factors may influence the development of autism, and it is often accompanied by sensory sensitivities and medical issues such as gastrointestinal (GI) disorders, seizures or sleep disorders, as well as mental health challenges such as anxiety, depression and attention issues.

Signs of autism usually appear by age 2 or 3. Some associated development delays can appear even earlier, and often, it can be diagnosed as early as 18 months. Research shows that early intervention leads to positive outcomes later in life for people with autism.

** In 2013, the American Psychiatric Association merged four distinct autism diagnoses into one umbrella diagnosis of autism spectrum disorder (ASD). They included autistic disorder, childhood disintegrative disorder, pervasive developmental disorder-not otherwise specific (PDD-NOS) and Asperger syndrome.*

Data shows that as of 2022 **nearly 1 out of 36** kiddos may have ASD. Boys are 4 times more likely than girls.

WHAT IS APPLIED BEHAVIOR ANALYSIS (ABA)?

What is Applied Behavior Analysis? Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) is a therapy based on the science of learning and behavior.

Behavior analysis helps us to understand: How behavior works, How behavior is affected by the environment, How learning takes place,

ABA therapy applies our understanding of how behavior works to real situations. The goal is to increase behaviors that are helpful and decrease behaviors that are harmful or affect learning.

ABA therapy programs can help: Increase language and communication skills, Improve attention, focus, social skills, memory, and academics, Decrease problem behaviors

The methods of behavior analysis have been used and studied for decades. They have helped many kinds of learners gain different skills – from healthier lifestyles to learning a new language. Therapists have used ABA to help children with autism and related developmental disorders since the 1960s.

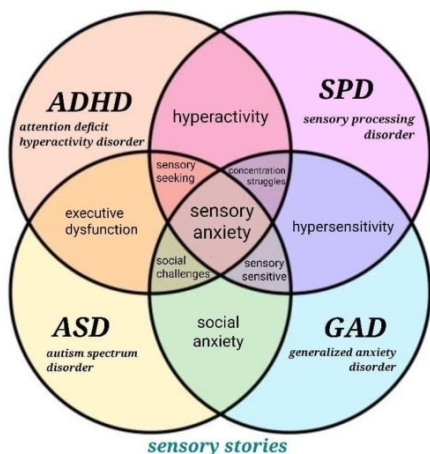

COMMON CO-OCCURRING DIAGNOSIS WITH ASD

- **Most Common:** ADHD, General Anxiety Disorder (GAD), Sensory Processing Disorder (SPD) and Depression. Many times the co-occurring challenges are lumped under ASD and are not addressed. Identifying and treating these issues can make a huge difference in behaviors, sleeping, eating, etc.

SENSORY/SENSORY PROCESSING DISORDER (SPD)

People with autism might have sensitivities to: Sights, Sounds, Smells, Tastes, Touch Balance (vestibular), Awareness of body position and movement (proprioception), Awareness of internal body cues and sensations (interception).

Autistic people can experience both **hypersensitivity** (over-responsiveness) and **hyposensitivity** (under-responsiveness) to a wide range of stimuli. Most people have a combination of both.

Sensory processing disorder (SPD) is often confused with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) due to the similarities and connections that exist. While the two have many similarities, SPD is often a comorbid symptom of ASD, but not all children with sensory processing disorder have autism.

TUMMY ISSUES

Children with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) tend to have more medical issues, including gastrointestinal (GI) symptoms such as abdominal pain, constipation and diarrhea, compared with their peers.

At the same time, many children with ASD eat only a few foods (selective eating), prefer highly processed foods, and eat fewer fruits, vegetables and whole grains.

SLEEP ISSUES

A 2019 study, one of the largest to investigate the prevalence of sleep problems in autism, suggested that nearly 80 percent of [autistic preschoolers have disrupted sleep](#). Sleep problems are twice as common among children with autism as they are among typical children or those with other developmental conditions.

VISION

Doctors recommend that children with ASD have a functional visual evaluation in order to assess many other important aspects of the visual system, namely: eye movements, eye teaming, eye tracking, visual processing, visual-spatial judgment, and central/peripheral vision. According to research, children with ASD present with a higher incidence of [strabismus](#) (eye turn) ranging from 21-50 percent prevalence, as compared to children without ASD.

Common vision issues include: Poor eye contact, Looking beyond/through objects, Absence of reciprocal play, Extreme fear of heights or absence of appropriate fear of heights, Tracking moving objects accurately, Maintaining eye contact with people, Eye alignment (eye turns), Keeping their eyes from wandering ([amblyopia/lazy eye](#)), Light sensitivity, Head turning (looking at objects from the side of the eyes), Fleeting views or rolling eyes, Visual stimming (flapping fingers in front of eyes)

SEIZURES

Seizures are more common in individuals with autism than in the general population. In the general population, [fewer than 1%](#) of children (age 17 and younger) develop clinical seizures. By comparison, one of the largest studies aimed at identifying the prevalence of epilepsy in children with autism found that among children aged 13 years and older with ASD, 26% were diagnosed with epilepsy. ([Viscidi E.W. et. al, 2013](#)).

IFSP Individualized Family Service Plan- Ages Birth to 3 years old

No Referrals Needed! The IFSP is a written treatment plan for Early Intervention (EI). It details your child’s current levels of functioning, specific needs and goals for treatment (referred to as outcomes). The first step in writing the IFSP will be for the members of your child’s team to conduct various types of assessments to identify your child’s individual strengths and needs. The IFSP will include information about your child’s current level of development in the following areas: Physical development, Cognitive development, Communication development, Social & emotional development, Adaptive development, Fine and gross motor skills, Vision, Hearing, etc. The IFSP is developed with input from the child’s entire family, and it includes features that are designed to support the entire family.
